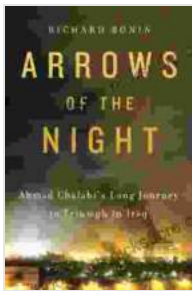


# Ahmad Chalabi and the Selling of the Iraq War: A Tale of Deception and Manipulation

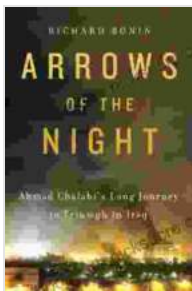
