

I'm not sure I have it in me anymore. I'm not sure I have the talent. I'm not sure I have the drive. But I'm here. I'm here because I have to be. I have to believe that I can do this.

I have to believe that I can be great. I have to believe that I can make a difference. Because if I don't believe it, then who will?

So I'm going to give it my all. I'm going to put everything I have into this audition. And I'm going to hope for the best.

"The Father" by Florian Zeller

In this monologue, an elderly man with dementia reflects on his life and his fading memories. He struggles to make sense of his present and to hold on to his past.

[Character:] Where am I? Who am I? What's happening to me?


I used to know. I used to know everything. I used to be a father. I used to be a husband. I used to be a man.


