Leaving Norway

Ingeborg was born in the small village of Øvre Rendal in southeastern Norway in 1830. She grew up in a farming family and had little formal education. In 1854, at the age of 24, she decided to emigrate to America with her husband, Ole, and their two young children. Like many other

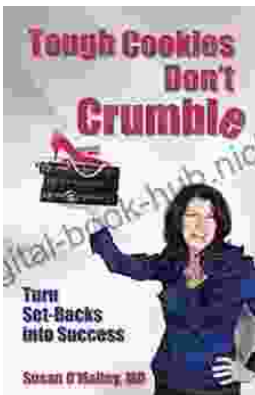
