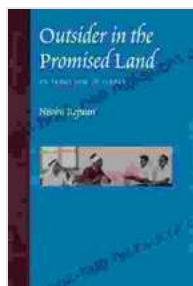


Outsider in the Promised Land: A Journey Through the American Heartland

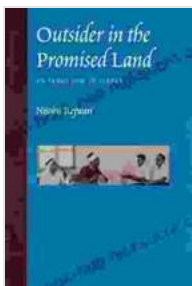

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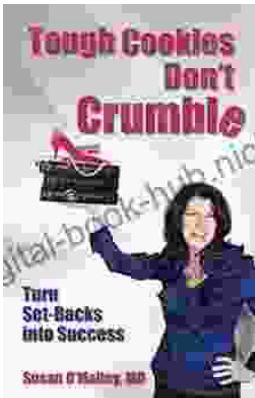
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
