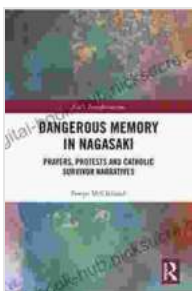


# Prayers, Protests, and Catholic Survivor Narratives: Asia Transformations 55

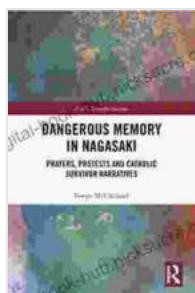
