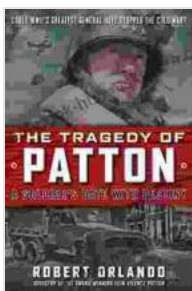


## : A Life Cut Short

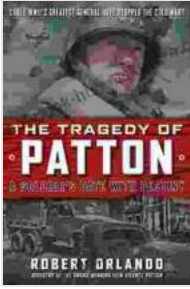

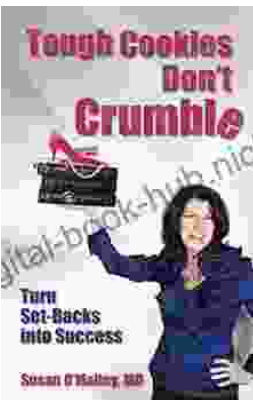
