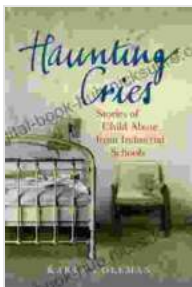


Uncovering the Horrors: Stories of Child Abuse in Catholic Ireland

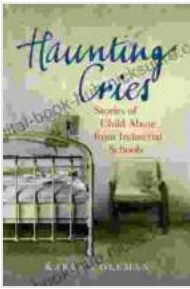
The legacy of child abuse in Catholic Ireland is still felt today. Survivors of abuse continue to suffer from the physical, emotional, and psychological scars of their experiences.

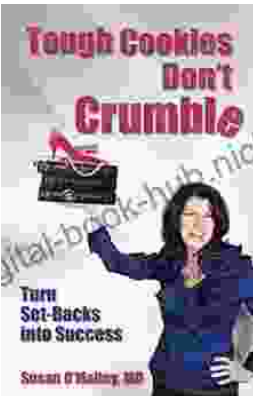
